Prepositions of Time



preposition of time	meaning	use	example
а	at	to tell the time	Todos los días me despierto <b>a</b> las 7. Every day I wake up at 7.
	after	to indicate the period of time after something happened	Conoció a Miguel y empezaron a trabajar juntos <b>al</b> mes. She met Miguel and they started working together after a month.
de	in	to introduce a part of the day corresponding to an hour	Me gusta leer a las 9 <b>de</b> la noche. I like to read at 9 in the evening.
	at	with the phrases de día [at daytime], de noche [at nighttime], de madrugada [at dawn]	Muchas personas trabajan <b>de</b> noche. Many people work at night.
	from	(combined with a) to indicate the starting and ending points of an action or situation	Trabajo <b>de</b> lunes a viernes. I work from Monday to Friday.
por	in	to introduce the parts of the day	Por la mañana hago ejercicio y voy a la universidad. In the morning, I workout and go to the university.
	for	to express the duration of an activity or event	Estuvimos en la reunión <b>por</b> 45 minutos. We were at the meeting for 45 minutes.
para	by, for	to introduce a deadline in a specific time	La tarea es <b>para</b> el viernes a la medianoche. The homework is due by Friday at midnight.





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en	in	to talk about months, seasons, and years	Me gustar ir a la montaña <b>en</b> invierno. I like to go to the mountain in winter.
		with phrases with the word momento	En febrero hablé con María. <b>En</b> ese momento ella estaba trabajando para un canal de televisión. I spoke with María in February. At that time, she was working for a television channel.
		to introduce a period of time in the future in which something is going to happen or is expected to happen	Ahora estoy trabajando, pero te llamaré en media hora. Right now I'm working, but I'll call you in half an hour.
desde	from, since	to indicate the starting point of an action	Estuvimos en casa de Nicolás <b>desde</b> las 5. We were at Nicolas' since 5.
hasta	to, until	to indicate the ending point of an action	Estuvimos en casa de Nicolás <b>hasta</b> la medianoche. We were at Nicolas' until midnight.
	see you (on)	in expressions like "see you tomorrow" or with days of the week: "see you on Wednesday!"	i <b>Hasta</b> mañana! See you tomorrow! (literal: Until tomorrow!)





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desde hasta de a	from until/to	to indicate when something happened, including the starting and ending points	Estuvimos en casa de Nicolás <b>desde</b> las 5 <b>hasta</b> la medianoche. We were at Nicolás' from 5 until midnight.
durante	during	to emphasize the duration of an action	Muchas personas hicieron preguntas durante la presentación.  Many people asked questions during the presentation.
tras	after, afterwards	to indicate that an action happened after another	<b>Tras</b> la presentación, mi jefe me felicitó. After the presentation, my boss congratulated me.
entre	between	to indicate an intermediate situation	Nos vemos en el café <b>entre</b> las 3 y las 3:30. See you at the coffee shop between 3 and 3:30.
