## Tenses of haber when used to express existence

Indicative	haber	Example with singular or plural noun	Translation
present	Hay	un libro.	There is a book.
preterite	Hubo	una reunión.	There was a meeting.
imperfect	Había	mucha gente.	There were many people.
future	Habrá	dos opciones.	There will be two options.
present perfect	Ha habido	confusión.	There has been confusion.
past perfect	Había habido	un gran concierto.	There had been a great concert.

Subjunctive	Main clause	haber	Example with singular or plural noun	Translation
present	Espero que no	haya	errores.	I hope there are no errors.
imperfect	Esperaba que no	hubiera	errores.	I was hoping there were no errors.
present perfect	Espero que no	haya habido	una fiesta sin mi.	I hope there hasn't been a party without me.
past perfect	Esperaba que no	hubiera habido	clase.	I was hoping there hadn't been class.

Conditional	haber	Example with singular or plural noun	Translation
conditional simple	Habría	una explicación.	There would be an explanation.
conditional perfect	Habría habido	miles de asistentes.	There would have been thousands of attendees.

**IMPORTANT:** Never use *hay* with continuous tenses.

**IMPORTANT:** The verb *haber* has another important function in Spanish. It is used as the auxiliary of the compound tenses like the present perfect: *He comido* [I have eaten]. In this case, *haber* does have a different form per pronoun.

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
