Definite Articles



Feminine nouns that use a masculine article *el*

If you have a singular, feminine noun starting with stressed *a-* or *ha-*, you need to use the masculine definite article. We make this change because of phonetic reasons, to avoid having a longer vowel sound (*la aula*):

el aula the classroom *el hacha* the ax
 ↪ stressed ↪ stressed

But, if you're adding an adjective before or if you're using the plural form, there's no need to change:

Singular noun with an adjective	Plural form
<i>la otra aula</i> the other classroom	<i>las aulas</i> the classrooms

<i>el aula</i>	classroom	<i>las aulas</i>
<i>el aura</i>	aura	<i>las auras</i>
<i>el ave</i>	bird	<i>las aves</i>
<i>el habla</i>	speech	<i>las hablas</i>
<i>el hacha</i>	axe	<i>las hachas</i>
<i>el hada</i>	fairy	<i>las hadas</i>
